Putnam Schools Present Early Budget Numbers

School districts across the county – and the state – are busy putting together their preliminary budgets for the 2024-25 school year, with school boards and residents getting a first glimpse at some of those numbers.

In Brewster, Assistant Superintendent for Finance & Operations Victor Karlsson addressed the school board at its Feb. 6 meeting, presenting a \$119.7 million budget, which reflects a 3.5 percent or \$4 million increase over the current year, as a "starting point."

According to Karlsson, the state-mandated property tax cap allows the district to increase its tax levy by 3.12 percent, or \$2.5 million. He explained that the district's tax base growth factor accounted for 1.15 percent of that tax cap increase.

"There are new properties that have come onto the tax roll that are going to absorb a portion of the tax burden," he explained.

Other items that are included in the district's tax cap equation are changes to Payment In Lieu of Taxes agreements and to capital projects exclusions.

With 70 percent of the district's revenue made up through property

taxes, the district welcomes a 2.9 percent, or \$900,000, increase in state education aid.

To fill the deficit between expenditures and revenue, Karlsson suggests the district use \$200,000 in fund balance/reserves – which is less than it has used in the past. "We're actually reducing our reliance on savings to balance our budget," he said.

In addition, the Employee Retirement System pension contribution rate for noncertificated staff is increasing significantly, noted Karlsson. "We have an ERS reserve established, so we'll be drawing down on that to help offset those increases," he said.

In Carmel, Assistant Superintendent for Business John Fink presented an initial \$1.27 million to the school board at its Feb. 6 meeting.

He noted that state aid is "underfunded" this year, with \$38.5 million (an increase of \$1.2 million) currently earmarked for the district, putting more reliance on the tax levy.

"Over the past three years, when state aid has been more generous, there has been less reliance on the tax levy, resulting in \$4,364,113

In 1986, Brendan became a New York State court officer. *Continued on Page 10* trict students will benefit from two separate grants that will provide emotional support services at George Fischer Middle School and Carmel High School.

The district has been awarded a \$227,432 state Mental Health RECOVS grant for the middle school, and a separate \$25,000 state grant to a local community services agency will fund a satellite mental health clinic at the high school.

The state RECOVS grant, which Gov. Kathy Hochul awarded at the end of January, will be used to fund social and emotional learning programs and a full-time social worker at GFMS through the 2024-25 school year, according to Interim Superintendent Joseph McGrath.

"We realized that now, more than ever, students need support," he said. "We wanted to take a holistic approach that would meet am grateful to the governor for offering this line of support to our students."

While the governor announced RECOVS grants totaling \$100 million for 50 school districts and BOCES, Carmel is the only district in Putnam County to receive one.

"New York is making historic investments to ensure all our students are on the path toward success," said Hochul. "This funding will help our teachers and school staff pinpoint where students have fallen behind and provide students with the crucial resources needed to support their mental health, especially after the pandemic."

At CHS, a satellite mental health clinic will be run by the Student Assistance Services Corporation, in collaboration with the Prevention Council of Putnam. *Continued on Page 10*

Residents of Putnam County owe a thank-you to those elected officials who recently contacted the New York City Department of Environmental Protection to save the Belden House, a classic and rare example of American Gothic design on city watershed next to West Branch Reservoir in Carmel that now faces obliteration.

As many in Putnam know, in the late 1990s the DEP deemed Belden House no longer useful to NYC's water supply purposes and ceased investing in its upkeep. Meanwhile, volunteers' tireless efforts over the last 25 years to preserve it with the support of the DEP and our county government have gone nowhere.

At the urging of Friends of Belden House (www.friendsofbeldenhouse.org), Legislator Greg Ellner requested DEP Deputy Commissioner Paul Rush prioritize efforts to reach an agreement on stewardship and expenses before years of official and shameful neglect take their final toll. Putnam County Executive Kevin Byrne and County Legislators William Gouldman, Toni Addonizio and Erin Crowley co-signed Ellner's letter. Fortunately, Commissioner Rush pledged to "work together with our neighboring communities and to come up with any creative solutions there may be for the property."

We hope more Putnam residents and elected officials join this 11th hour initiative to restore and maintain this iconic structure as soon as possible.

I was pleased to read in your paper (Jan. 11) that County Executive Byrne is taking steps to reduce the cost of county government. I would like to make a few suggestions to further his objectives. By doing this publicly, perhaps some of the suggestions would have sufficient merit to gain public support.

The underlying theme is consolidation. At the top of my list is transferring some town functions to the county level. The easiest would be the collection of town and county real estate taxes.

Another opportunity for efficiency would be shared equipment and services between town and county highway departments. There are specialized pieces of equipment that are not in regular use that the county could take ownership of and schedule among the users, such as the equipment for clearing of street drainage basins, street sweepers, and lake weed cutters.

Many of our streets pass from one municipality to another. Can agreements be made between municipalities so a single municipality would do the necessary roadwork for the entire length of the street? I suspect fire departments and police have worked out such arrangements.

There must be numerous other opportunities for shared services. I suggest the county establish a committee (always a good substitute for action) to investigate such opportunities.

Over the many years I have lived here, I have often heard the expression "home rule" raised as an objection to increased county authority, but I would respond, "So why do we need a country level of government?"

I suspect Grover Norquist would ask, "Why do we need both town and county? Connecticut gets by with just one level of local government."

*Bud*get season is in full swing, and I write to give readers of this publication some details on the process so far, as well as to encourage you to make yourselves heard during discussions.

Following the governor's presentation of her budget proposal last month, my colleagues and I have been discussing areas where we differ from the governor, in preparation for negotiations. A particular area of concern for me relates to education.

I have been fighting for fully funded schools since I was a school board member in Ossining, and last year's historic win bringing us up to full funding of Foundation Aid was important to me and so many school districts and students throughout Assembly District 95. Although the governor's proposed budget nominally increases school aid, the details of the proposal reveal it to be a step backward from where we are today. This is a non-starter for me and many in the Legislature. It is not fair to our school districts, or the children they serve, to cut their state aid without warning. This proposal would force school districts to choose between making cuts or raising taxes. At a time when working- and middle-class families are already struggling, an education proposal that could lead to property tax increases is ill-advised and regressive. I have already heard from many of you who feel there are a range of other needs that do not

get the funding they deserve in this proposal – roads, water infrastructure, health care, environmental protection and so much more. Water Utility Offers Scholarships

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Nutrition Corner

Game Food

Folks who know me well know that I believe the best part of the super bowl is the food. With the usual drop in price of avocados topping the list. If you come to my house for your game food, you will be served some usual dishes, done with unexpected twists. With small shifts in the ingredients, an emphasis on veggies and grains, and other thoughtful approaches, I find ways to make typical game food just a bit more nutritious and balanced.

Start by simply lowering the saturated fat and calories where you can. Recipes (like the one below) can be easily modified with lower fat/part skim options. Since the average Super Bowl spread offers far more calories than you may realize, any small change is helpful. One of the best modifications you can make is to replace sour cream with nonfat, plain Greek yogurt. With this ingredient change, you're not only removing saturated fat, but also adding satiating protein to create a more filling dish.

Aside from fat and calories, sodium is also too high in the typical game food menu. To manage this, look for "no salt added" or "unsalted" canned foods, chips, sauces and more. Simply buying "reduced sodium" items is often not enough, as this simply means that the product only offers 25% less than that brand's original product. In many cases this is still quite high.

I also recommend preparing a large veggie plate served with hummus or similar dip. I usually have this available as guests arrive, which means it's enjoyed early in the evening. It also means that you're doing your guests a favor by offering them filling, satisfying fiber.

The final recommendation isn't necessarily about ingredients, but rather about the way you approach your evening. Even with modifications and better ingredients, you're still likely to indulge while enjoying the big game. I strongly recommend using an individual plate with your favorite

foods portioned out, rather than eating straight from a serving dish. This ensures that you will know just how much you consumed.

Ingredients:

1 (16-oz.) package frozen cauliflower florets

1 (15.5-oz.) can no salt added cannellini beans, drained and rinsed

1 (1-oz.) packet ranch seasoning

1/4 cup Buffalo-style hot sauce

4 oz. cream cheese 1/4 cup sour cream

2 Tbsp. water

1/4 cup crumbled blue cheese,

plus more for serving 1/2 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese

2 green onions, thinly sliced Carrots, celery, and whole grain chips, for serving

Directions:

1. Center a rack in oven and heat to 375 degrees.

2. Microwave cauliflower in a medium bowl until tender, 6 to 8 minutes. Cut into bite-size pieces.


3. Meanwhile, process beans, ranch seasoning, hot sauce, cream cheese, sour cream, and water in a food processor until smooth. Stir in cauliflower and blue cheese, then transfer to a 1 1/2-quart oven-safe baking dish and smooth top.

4. Bake until dip is heated through and beginning to bubble around edges, 15 to 20 minutes. Top with shredded cheese, then continue to bake until cheese is melted, about 5 more minutes. Sprinkle with green onions and more crumbled blue cheese and serve hot with carrots, celery, and whole grain chips.

Putnam Investigator Honored by NYS Sheriff's Institute

Putnam County Sheriff's Office Senior Investigator Corinne Pitt was recently recognized by the New York State Sheriffs' Institute with the Sheriff Colleen O'Neill Award.

This prestigious accolade, named after the state's first elected female sheriff, honors a female officer who has demonstrated either exceptional valor or significant advancement of the sheriff's office.

Pitt, who has a 17-year career with the PCSO, has served in various capacities, including in patrol and narcotics, as a school resource officer, and with the Bureau of Criminal Investigation.

"Senior Investigator Pitt has worked on some challenging highprofile cases – the investigation and arrest of a medical doctor providing and selling illegal prescriptions to people in New York and New Jersey that occurred over 15 years, the investigation and arrest of a high school teacher for rape, the investigation and arrest of an individual for a homicide spanning three states," said Saratoga County Sheriff Michael Zurlo, chairman of the institute, at the awards ceremony.

Pitt was also involved in the investigation and arrest of two male predators for sexual assault and rape, and the investigation of multiple arrests involving human trafficking.

In addition to serving on the Color Guard, bike and motorcycle patrol, the hostage negotiations team and as a task force officer with the Department of Homeland Security, Pitt helped establish a residence for adult crime victims where they can discretely meet

with law enforcement, along with their children and families.

Pitt, who credits her interest in law enforcement to reading Nancy Drew books a child, thanked the late Sheriff O'Neill for being a trailblazer. She also thanked her male counterparts.

"I never worked closely with another female because when I came on, there were none," she said. "It was my male coworkers who made me who I am today. It was my male coworkers who extended and offered me every opportunity that I have had throughout my entire career."

Pitt said the Putnam County Sheriff's Office is now turning out shifts that at times are a majority of female deputies.

"I never thought I would see that at any point in my career," she said. "When I leave the room and I hear a whisper, 'That is what I want to be like,' I laugh to myself and think that maybe I did do something right after all."

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Arts Orgs. Receive Funding

Bringing the services of a clinician/therapist into the building fits a "community school" model where the school partners with a local agency to offer the range of supports that meet the needs of students and families, explained CHS Principal Brian Piazza.

"Over the past several years we have seen an increased need for mental health counseling services for our students due to a rise in depression, anxiety, and other mental health concerns amongst young people in our community," he said. "This grant will allow us to ensure our students and families in need of services can be referred to a mental health professional in our community for support, with the bonus of that individual working out of a space at Carmel High School."

Having the services in-house will allow for easier access to these services, in a timely manner, according to Piazza. Students will be primarily referred by the school's pupil personnel support team (psychologists, social workers, school counselors) and required to have parental consent and involvement for services, which will be billed to the student's insurance or Medicaid.

"Research shows that students are six times more likely to get mental health services if they are provided within the school district," explained McGrath. "So we have strategically sought and received outside funding to further support the mental wellness of our students."

Advocates Push for Fully-Funded School Meals

Assemblyman Matt Slater, R-Yorktown, recently took part in a bipartisan press conference in Albany, reiterating his call for the governor to allocate funds for universal school meals. Despite the success of the program in schools like Carmel and Brewster, there remains a need for broader implementation.

Universal meals not only ensure equality for children and families by eliminating stigma and offering financial relief, but they also eliminate school meal debt. Notably, during the pandemic, the implementation of universal school meals resulted in a 7 percent reduction in hunger, according to Slater.

"Hunger impacts every community, and with New York State's substantial budget, there's no valid reason not to support this initiative,"

Putnam Schools Present Early he said. "Prioritizing our children is paramount, and ensuring each child has access to a nutritious meal lays the foundation for academic success."

Marisa O'Leary, director of Putnam Community Action Partnership, said funding healthy school meals for all is an essential step toward reducing child hunger.

"Many families that are struggling to meet their basic needs exceed the current income eligibility requirements for their children to receive free school breakfast and lunch," she said. "By ensuring all students have equitable access to school meals, we are not only reducing food insecurity, but ensuring children have the nutritional foundation they need to succeed academically."



not being sent to the taxpayers," said Fink. "For the 2024-25 school year, the CCSD will need to rely more heavily on the tax levy to maintain programs."

Under the tax cap, the district may increase its tax levy from \$101.3 million this year to \$104.9 million next year, an increase of 3.52 percent or \$3.57 million.

If the district collects the maximum tax levy and uses the same amount of fund balance as this year (\$1.1 million), residents in Carmel, Patterson, Putnam Valley, Southeast and East Fishkill would see a tax increase of \$74 per \$100,000 of assessed value. This means that for a house assessed at \$350,000, the property owner would pay \$259 In Mahopac, the tax cap allows the district to increase its levy 2.57 percent, or \$2.4 million, to \$98.1 million.

It is anticipating a \$1.4 million increase in state aid. >

Major cost drivers for the district include contractual salaries within three different bargaining units that are currently in negotiations, an estimated 2 percent increase in the cost of BOCES services, a 15.2 percent increase to ERS for non-instructional salaries (up from 13.1 percent this year), a 10 percent increase to the Teacher Retirement System on instructional salaries (up from 9.7 percent this year), a 5 percent increase in health insurance rates, a 2 percent increase in transportation costs and a 2 percent increase in utilities.
